Have Jaith in God

People often ask me to explain the Charismatic Renewal. So, of course I talk about the essential place of the Holy Spirit in our lives, about the need for a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, and I try to help them to understand the importance of the charisms. But more and more I find myself talking about faith and fruit.

The Fruits of the Renewal (John Paul II, May 15, 1987)

A priest once admitted to me that although he didn't like the Charismatic Renewal he did like the fruit it produced. He felt uncomfortable with raised hands, enthusiastic praise, and spontaneous prayer. Some individuals had caused problems in his parish. He felt they gave the impression that those who were "renewed" were

somehow superior to those who were not --and he had obviously been placed in the second group! But at the same time he was thankful to God for the obvious changes which had resulted for their contact with the Charismatic Renewal. They were now praying again, and

reading the Scriptures daily. They were coming regularly to the sacraments, especially to the Eucharist, and giving their time and money with a new generosity. They were concerned for their fellow parishioners, and with the wider issues of justice and peace. Their

faith had come alive, and it showed. The fruit was good and it was growing.

When those in authority in the Church look at something new like the Charismatic Renewal they look for the fruit -- for changed lives. It's no coincidence that when Pope John Paul II spoke about the Charismatic Renewal he almost always refers to the fruit it has produced in the life of the Church: "The vigor and the fruits of the Renewal certainly testify to the powerful presence of the Holy Spirit in the Church during these years following the Second Vatican Council." (May 15, 1987) In this case you and I are the fruit of the Renewal, but before the fruit can grow, something else has to be at work in our lives -- faith.

What is Faith? (Hebrews 11:1-2)

All over the world people have grown in faith through the Charismatic Renewal. It has been described as the catalyst of new faith. For some it has been their first encounter with the person of Jesus Christ, but for others it has been the means of renewing a weak or an

ineffective faith. A charismatic experience should always lead to a growth in faith. A lack of faith will limit God and make us ineffective Christians, whereas a dynamic, living faith makes almost anything possible. (Eph. 3:20) If we are to receive God's promises, if we are to enter fully into the relationship He wants to have with us, then we must put our hope and trust in Him and become people of faith. When we exercise faith we're not taking a leap into the darkness or jumping off a cliff. What we are doing is putting our trust in what God has revealed to us and said about Himself. We are trusting that he will do what He has said He will do. "What is faith? It is the confident assurance that what we hope for is going to happen. It is the evidence of things we cannot yet see. God gave His approval to people in days of old because of their faith." (Heb. 11:1-2, New Living Bible)

In Hebrews chaper 11 we are reminded of the great examples of faith -- Abel, Enoch ("without faith it is impossible to please God" v6), Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Gideon, David -- the list goes on. None of these people were perfect. They all had weaknesses and faced difficulties. But each of them had faith in God and put it into practice. Faith comes to us from God through revelation, but we need to exercise it.

Faith-Man's Response to God

The Catechism of the Catholic Church is divided into four parts, each one dealing with our life of faith. The first part is entitled "The Profession of Faith," and looks at the revelation of God through Scripture and Tradition, and at our response in the words of the Creed. Part Two is about "The Sacraments of Faith." and looks at the way in which salvation is made present to us in the prayer and liturgy of the Church as we celebrate "The Christian Mystery." Part Three is how we live "The Life of Faith," and focuses on the Commandments and the Beatitudes, reminding us that

Christianity is all about our right conduct, freely chosen, and lived out in society through God's law and His grace. Finally, Part Four is about "Prayer in the Life of Faith," and looks at the call to prayer, the traditions of prayer, and at the importance of the Lord's Prayer (Our Father) and the seven petitions we find there.

All of this not only emphasizes the importance of faith if we are to live good and effective Christian lives, but shows us that our faith does not exist in isolation. The community of believers, the Church. holds this revelation of God for all generations, and is required to clearly present it to us in ways we can both understand and receive it. In Section 162 the Church reminds us that "faith is an entirely free gift that God makes to man." But we can lose this priceless gift, so "to live, grow, and persevere in the faith until the end we must nourish it with the Word of God: we must beg the Lord to increase our faith; it must be working through charity, abounding in hope, and rooted in the faith of the Church." Why? "Believing in Jesus Christ and in the one who sent Him for our salvation is necessary for obtaining the salvation." (Section 161)

The Life of Faith--(Catechism Part Three)

If we look in a little more detail at living the life of faith in Part Three, we find that it begins with a Section on "Man's Vocation--Life in the Spirit." A guick look at the first three articles in this Section shows us that the Church begins by reminding us that our human dignity has its roots in the fact that we are all created in the image and likeness of God. We must treat everyone accordingly. Then we are reminded that the Beatitudes lie at the heart of Jesus' preaching, and that they teach us the final end to which we are called -the Kingdom of God, participation in the divine nature, and eternal life. The Beatitudes also confront us with decisive choices about earthly goods, and set the standards for their use in accordance with the law of God.

We also find ourselves challenged by the fact that we are free to initiate and control our own actions. By free will we shape our own lives, choosing between good and evil -- the more we do what is good the freer we become. But this freedom to act brings with it a responsibility for those actions -- the exercise of our freedom does not give us the right to say or do whatever we want. When we deviate from God's law, we violate our own freedom and that of our neighbor, as well as rebelling against God. "For freedom, Christ has set us free." (Gal. 5:1)

If we then jump ahead to Chapter Two, we find some fascinating insights into the individual in society, our participation in social life, and importance of social justice. We are reminded that we need life in society in order to develop in accordance with our nature, and that every human community needs an authority in order to endure and develop. Respect for the human person considers the other "another self," and presupposes respect for the dignity and rights of that person. What a difference it would make if we all lived in accordance with that understanding. Let me encourage you to read about the Life in Christ in the Catechism--it's very challenging!


Living in Faith--(Galatians 2:20)

If we are to live this life of faith we need to keep in mind that the grace of the Holy Spirit confers upon you and me the righteousness of God. We are united by faith and Baptism to the passion and death of Jesus, thereby becoming sharers in His life. Grace is the help God gives us to respond to our calling to be His sons and daughters. Our free will allows us to co-operate with God or to turn away from Him, but we are responsible for all our actions.

Do we really understand what this means? John tells us that our faith will overcome the world (1 John 5:4), but are we exercising and living in that sort of faith? Have we really aim derectored that it's

LEADER'S FOCUS • STRENGTHENING PRAYER GROUPS

HOW TO PROCLAIM AND RECEIVE THE GOOD NEWS IN PRAYER COMMUNITIES

Stop and think about the last prayer meeting, ministry meeting or charismatic gathering you attended. Surely there was praise and listening to the word of God. However, did you have time to dwell on God's word, or to share your particular challenges in bringing the good news of Jesus into daily life? Part of proclaiming God's word is letting it echo in our hearts. As St. Paul exhorts us in Colossians (3:16), "Christ's message in all its richness must live in your hearts."

Walter Matthews, in his NSC leaflet, Charismatic Prayer Meetings, offers a good explanation of how God's word is proclaimed at gatherings. He points out that the first element of praise helps us proclaim God's glory. The second element is listening to the Lord through scripture, prophecy and teachings. The third element applies God's loving care through intercessory prayer. But is our experience of "listening to the Lord" successful; or does "listening" become sharing of a string of scriptures and lengthy silences without the opportunity to apply God's word to our lives?

Ponder and pour over the word

If you find it difficult to take prayer meeting scriptures to heart, leaders might occasionally modify a prayer meeting by adding *lectio divina*, or sacred reading, between proclaiming God's word and intercessory prayer. This approach has been used by monastic communities for centuries and can be helpful at ministry meetings, workshops, bible studies and even at large charismatic gatherings. Here are the steps. They take about ten to fifteen minutes.

- The leader of the meeting chooses and slowly proclaims one of the previous scripture readings. The goal is to allow time for group meditation and sharing.
- The passage is repeated again, inviting everyone to listen for a word or phrase that strikes the heart or mind.
- These phrases are prayerfully repeated out loud.

⊕ Next, invite people to share the personal meaning of each phrase with the group (of ten or less). In a group of more than ten, people can share with someone nearby.

Reasons for this approach:

- 1. As Pope Paul VI pointed out in On Evangelization in the Modern World, the first people we should delve into the word with are each other. "The Church begins by being evangelized herself. She is the community of believers, the community of hope lived and communicated... and she needs to listen unceasingly to what she must believe (13)."
- 2 Sharing meaningful phrases helps us consider the relationship between our daily lives and God's particular word. It often triggers the gift of prophecy, as well.
- **3.** Scripture based faith sharing provides an entry point into the community for new people, especially those who enjoyed small group sharing during a Holy Spirit Seminar.
- **4.** Lectio offer a communal model of receiving God's word and a good transition to intercessory prayer for the needs that have surfaced.

Faith sharing during a Holy Spirit Seminar

It is also important to review how we receive God's word during a Holy Spirit Seminar. Too often we think of talks as the key proclamation. But this is not true. Small group sharing is equally important. It is faith sharing that helps people explore their response to the good news and discover concrete ways to live in the Holy Spirit. Faith sharing is like connective tissue, or glue, linking daily life and God's intervention. The Spirit awakens faith as we share our experiences of accepting or rejecting God's word. Successful faith sharing groups also allow participants to feel at home with community members later on. It is one of the first things participants look for after a seminar. And it is ongoing sharing of our relationships with God that connects all of us as a growing community.

But good faith sharing during a

seminar does not happen by accident. It happens through deliberate actions, like befriending new people, rather than spending time socializing with old friends. It happens through training at ongoing team meetings where listening and sharing skills are learned. It happens when we nurture people's daily spiritual lives through phone calls and emails. So let us commit ourselves to deep, more conscious ways of receiving God's word through sacred reading and faith sharing. Let us pray with the US bishops, "Awakened and energized by the Spirit, let us strengthen our commitment and intensify our efforts to help the adults in our communities be touched and transformed by the life-giving message of Jesus, to explore its meaning, experience its power, and live in its light... This is the Lord's work. In the power of the Spirit it will not fail but will bear lasting fruit" (Our Hearts Were Burning Within Us: A Pastoral Plan for Adult Faith Formation in the United States, USCCB, pg. 35).

by grace that we have been saved through faith, not by anything of our own but by a gift of God? (Eph. 2:5) Do we accept that "only faith can guarantee the blessings that we hope for, or prove the existence of the realities that at present remain unseen?" (Heb. 11:11) Can we say with Paul "the life I now live in this body I live in faith: faith in the Son of God who loved me and who sacrificed Himself for my sake?" (Gal. 2:20) The prophet Daniel reminds us (11:32) that the people who know their God will stand firm and take action. It seems to me that's what living a life of faith is all about.
