There is much confusion in people's minds about the gift of tongues. Many think that to speak in tongues means to possess a gift of preaching God's word in a human language which one has not learned before, as happened on Pentecost (Acts 2) Others pick out of context certain texts from St. Paul and claim that Paul discouraged the use of this gift. Though probably well-intentioned, such people are mistaken, for a discerning study of scripture will show that there are three aspects of the gift of tongues: in a few cases, it is a (miraculous) sign; quite frequently, it is an ordinary message from God to the assembly; and in the vast majority of cases, it is just a beautiful gift of prayer. Moreover, far from belittling the gift, Paul had a high regard for its varied uses.

Public Use

Most of Paul's advice about tongues in the first letter to the Corinthians deals with the disciplined use of tongues in public gatherings of the disciples for prayer and fellowship. In giving his advice, Paul was meeting felt needs of the Corinthian church and was answering questions they had put to him. (1 Cor. 7:1; 11:18; 12:1) Far from discouraging the use of tongues, Paul was encouraging them to use it properly, for the common

benefit. In the public context, two possible functions are fulfilled by this charism: message and sign.

When the gift is used for speaking a message, what is spoken aloud to the assembly in tongues must be made intelligible. Hence Paul advises about the need for the charism of interpretation. (1 Cor. 14:5, 27) Interpretation is not translation, since the one interpreting will not understand the strange sounds spoken. Rather,

by Fr. Fio Mascarenhas, SJ the interpreter will be inspired by the Spirit to share in faith an insight or idea about what the message is. This is similar to the operation of prophecy. Paul even encourages the speaker in tongues to himself pray for the power to interpret. (1 Cor. 14:13)

The gift can, it seems, serve as a sign: the strange sounds uttered are sometimes intelligible by themselves, miraculously, without need for interpretation. In this case, the one for whom the sign is meant (see 1 Cor. 14:22) may understand the sounds because they are a real human language of his acquaintance. This is what seems to have happened on Pentecost Day, and perhaps at the conversion of Cornelius. (Acts 2:4-12; 10:45-46) One hears, too, of modern instances of this.

Personal Use in Prayer

"One who speaks in a tongue speaks not to men but to God; for no one understands him, but he utters mysteries in the Spirit...For if I pray in a tongue, my spirit prays but my mind is unfruitful." (1 Cor. 14:2, 14)

"Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words. (Rom. 8:26)

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Tongues is an aid to prayer. meant for those who at various times find themselves "weak" and unable to prayer well enough in the usual ways. It is a prayer which does not rely on concepts. Hence it can help a person to pray at any time, even when he or she is distracted. tired, or busy with mechanical work. It gives rest to the frenetic activity of the mind, a value appreciated by the spiritual masters of all traditions. It has many similarities with the Jesus prayer and with the prayer of quiet described in The Cloud of Unknowing. While not understood conceptually by the user, Paul assures us that God, to whom it is directed, understands. (Rom. 8:27)

We can see how pure this prayer is. In other forms of prayer we use thoughts and images as means for reaching out to God. In this prayer we go beyond them, we leave them behind, as we go to God Himself. It is a very pure act of faith. Perhaps in this prayer we will for the first time really act in *pure* faith. So often our faith is leaning on the concepts and images of faith. Here we go beyond them to the object of faith, leaving all the images and concepts behind.

We can see too how Christian this prayer is. For we truly die to ourselves, our more superficial selves, at the level of our thoughts, images, and feelings, in order to live for Christ. We "die" to all our thoughts and imaginings, no matter how beautiful they may be or how useful they might seem. We leave them all behind, for we want immediate contact with God Himself, and not some thought, image, or vision of Him--only the faith experience of God.

The gift is of use in praising God, when one runs out of words and ideas, and in prayer of intercession. When one does not know what to ask for or for whom to pray, the



Spirit is ready to intercede through our inarticulate sounds. (Rom. 8:26) The experience of those in the charismatic renewal is such that prayer is effective and fruitful.

The gift is also useful as a means of entering into the prayer of contemplation, as Benedictine and Trappist monks have testified, and for effectively waging spiritual warfare (Eph. 6:10-11, 18) Paul reminds us that we are all engaged in spiritual warfare. Our continual battle is not with human realities but with superhuman forces against whom we are helpless on our own. Hence our need to use the whole of God's armor and to rely fully on His gifts and power. This power we tap through faith.

Paul's experience, and the modern experience of those in the charismatic renewal, tells us that using the gift of tongues is a good way of waging war against the enemy with devastating effect, and of overcoming his temptations. No wonder we are so often tempted by the deceiver to belittle this gift and give up using it.

A Prayer of Faith

Since it builds up our faith, the gift of tongues is often called the doorway to the other gifts--the "threshold charism." To receive and use all the charisms such as prophecy, healing, the word of knowledge, and the rest, one needs to have active, claiming faith. Receiving--yielding to--the gift of tongues gives one an experience of what this means. In this way it is the doorway to the other gifts. However, yielding to tongues is not a pre-requisite to receiving the other gifts.

"He who speaks in a tongue edifies himself...Now I want you all to speak in tongues." (1 Cor. 14:4,5) To edify means to build up, to make firm and strong. Praying in tongues is an important way of buildling up our faith. Since we exercise our faith in using it, its frequent use makes that faith strong. A Gift Called Tongues continued from page 3 of doubt and weariness, the more is our faith edified, built up. Hence Paul, whose faith was tremendous, could boast publicly: "I thank God that I speak in tongues more than you all." (1 Cor. 14:18)

Of course, praying in tongues is only one of a number of forms of prayer. Those in the charismatic renewal also engage very much in liturgical prayer, the Eucharist, the Divine Office, and other traditional forms of public and private devotion. Paul himself encouraged this when he said, "I will pray with the spirit and I will pray with the mind also." (1 Cor. 14:15)

Prayer in tongues cannot be judged in itself. Because it goes beyond thought, beyond image, there is nothing left by which to judge it. In conceptually active prayer we can make some judgments after we have prayed: "I had some good insights," "I felt some good feelings," or, "I had lots of distractions." But all that is irrelevant to this prayer. Therefore, there is nothing left by which to judge the prayer in itself.

There is, however, one way in which the goodness of this prayer is

confirmed for us. Our Lord has said, "You can judge a tree by its fruits." If we are faithful to this form of prayer. making it a regular part of our day, we very quickly come to discern the maturing in our lives of the fruits of the Spirit. I have experienced this in my own life and have seen it again gift, in prayer. Tell Him the desire of and again in the lives of others.

How to Receive the Gift

This gift, then, in its three aspects, is a means and an opportunity to surrender all of ourselves--even our intellect!--to the Lordship of Jesus!

"If anyone thirst, let him come to Me and drink. He who believes in Me, as the scripture has said, 'Out of his heart shall flow rivers of living water." (John 7:37-38) If we would receive this gift we must:

1. Thirst for the gift. Reflect on the scriptures and be convinced in your own mind and heart that this gift is from God, intended for the church today, available to you. Remember Paul's words: "Earnestly desire the spiritual gifts...I want you all to speak in tongues...I thank God that I speak in tongues more than you all...One who speaks in a tongue speaks not

to men but to God...He who speaks in a tongue edifies himself...I will pray with the spirit and I will pray with the mind also ... Pray at all times in the Spirit." (1 Cor. 14:1, 5, 18, 2, 4, 16; Eph. 6:18)

- 2. Come to Jesus and ask for the your heart. Ask with love and faith.
- 3. Accept the gift from Jesus in faith and begin to use it. Know that God has answered your prayer. (Luke 11:13) Deliberately speak out in unintelligible sounds while focusing your attention entirely on God. One must intend these sounds to be either a prayer of praise or of intercession. Initially the gift may be very rudimentary--the same two or three syllables being repeated over and over again. But a regular and persistent use of the gift--say, 15 minutes a day--will lead in a few days to a more developed and satisfying tongue.

Our basis for this method is the expectant faith so often illustrated and encouraged in scripture; for example, in John 2:7-10; Luke 17:12-16: Matt. 14:22-31. Here the persons concerned had to take the first step. They had to act, disregarding the risk that nothing might happen and relying entirely on God's goodness and desire to act. And because they believed and acted on this belief, they discovered to their joy that they were indeed blessed.

"Whatever you ask in prayer, believe that you have received, and it will be yours." (Mark 11:24)

4. Continue to believe and use this gift for prayer. No human proofs are possible to encourage us toward this initial yielding to the gift. However, we will be convinced by the evidence which will follow its regular use. By its fruits in our life shall we be able to judge its value and authenticity. 
